The Lutheran Lay Fellowship of the Washington, DC, Metro Area (LLF) is pleased to announce the availability of two scholarship awards for 2017.

One of the five objectives of the LLF is "to initiate and support worthy project of a religious, charitable, and educational nature." The promotion and encouragement of the pursuit of degree oriented education among Lutheran students is the purpose of the scholarship program.

The intention of the scholarship is to direct awards to promising students entering careers which would enable them to help those in need of spiritual development, and/or affordable shelter and medical attention both at home and abroad. This intention is continued in this scholarship focusing on committed applicants going in their third or fourth year of undergraduate study.

For 2017, we are offering an additional scholarship to a Lutheran Seminary student.

LLF is an organization for women and men, both lay and clergy, active in the Nation's Capital area. "As early as 1936, feeling there was a definite need for closer cooperation between Lutheran laity and clergy, a group of laymen in the Washington, DC. Metropolitan area, organized to hold meetings that would bring pastors and laity closer together. Due to jurisdictional differences as well as ministerial difficulties, very little success was achieved until the fall of 1941. Then the group met and decided to hold a luncheon once a month, invite their friends and bring visitors. The first luncheon was a success, and within three months every Lutheran judicatory was represented..." [From a Lutheran Directory of Metropolitan Washington, DC, published in 1999.]

Today, more than 80 years later, the Lutheran Lay Fellowship of Metropolitan Washington takes pride in knowing that every night, 365 nights each year, more than 1,000 low income seniors and disabled persons live in safety and friendship in four high rises owned and managed by Fellowship Square Foundation, Inc. By means of annual scholarships and grants, LLF also supports various college and seminary students; it also provides ushering services for major inter-Lutheran events. But most of all, LLF is known far and wide as a place to hear stimulating speakers on timely topics and to make friends from other Lutheran congregations—friendships that last for decades!
